borrow another Army term. One way, definitely, is to take advantage of opportunities to attend professional meetings whenever possible. Is this a not-so-subtle invitation for WL teachers to attend the November 11 meeting? You bet it is. Last year, we had over 400 attendees. This year, we would love to see even more of you there. It really is a great opportunity to learn (and steal) from presenters, many of whom are among the most innovative and enthusiastic teachers in Utah. UFLA Welcomes Greg Duncan as our Keynote Speaker

For over 30 years, Greg Duncan has been a foreign language educator. Serving first as a high school teacher of Spanish for 12 years and then as a high school administrator for two years, he assumed the position of Coordinator for Foreign Languages and International Education in the Georgia Department of Education for nine years. Among his accomplishments during his tenure of service at the state level was the creation of the Elementary School Foreign Languages Model Program, which has been cited by the Washington-based Center for Applied Linguistics as a national model.

Greg has held various leadership positions at state, regional and national levels including serving as Executive Council Member and Program Chair for ACTFL. In 1999, Greg completed three years of service as Chair of the task force to create the new ACTFL Performance Guidelines for K-12 Learners. Among his honors was his designation as a recipient of the ACTFL / National Textbook Company Award for Building Community Interest in Foreign Language Education as well as the Federal Republic of Germany Friendship Award.

Theme: Regulations:

"Language Unplugged"

- Any K-12 student(s) currently enrolled in a class studying a language other than English may participate. Posters may be created by individual students or by groups of students or entire classes. 1
- All posters must be submitted by 9:00 AM, November 11, 2011. 2
- No school may submit more than one poster. It is recommended that each school have its own competition to choose the best school poster.
- Posters must be 18 x 24 inches. Posters larger or smaller than this will be disqualified. Each poster must be two dimensional (i.e., flat, suitable for reproduction). Each poster must be mounted flat on an 18 x 24 inch sheet of foam board. Posters that have been rolled up or folded will be disqualified.
- If a poster is a collaboration of several students or classes, all students must attend the same school.

Judging:

- Posters will be judged by teachers in attendance at UFLA. Final decisions will be made by the UFLA Executive Board and the Poster Contest Committee.
- Posters should celebrate, encourage or comment on the learning of languages other than English and should address the theme in some way.
- Posters will be judged on originality, creativity, visual impact and how they engage this year's theme.
- 1. Posters may only be submitted by a teacher who is a UFLA member; posters may not be submitted by students themselves or by their parents.
- 2. Posters may be taken to the registration desk at UFLA before 9:00 AM, Thursday, Nov. 11, 2010.
- 3. A teacher may call Jo Carmiol (801) 647-2118 to make arrangements to get the poster to the UFLA board if not attending the conference. Non-winning posters should be taken home at the end of the conference.

Why Study French

We have all heard that French is the "romantic" language, the language for "lovers," but truth of the matter is, French is first and foremost a very important language in business and trade, in politics and diplomacy, in art, music, design, fashion, and more.

French is listed as a critical language by the U. S. government. It is spoken in 55 countries. French is the third most common language on the Internet and is ranked the 2nd most influential language in the world. It is the official working language of the UN, NATO, UNESCO, the International Olympic Committee, and the European Union. French provides more than 50% of modern English vocabulary. We couldn't speak English without it. It is important in today's global economy to know another language, and based on the statistics, French is still one of the best choices for the following reasons, among others:

- 1. There are 2,400 US companies in France generating 240,000 jobs. American companies with offices in France include IBM, Microsoft, Mattel, Dow Chemical, SaraLee, Ford, Coca-Cola, AT&T, Motorola, Johnson & Johnson, and Hewlett Packard.
- 2. France is the second leading investor in the United States: more than 3,000 French companies, including Mack Trucks, Zenith, RCA-Thomson, Bic, and Dannon, have subsidiaries in the US and generate some 700,000 jobs.
- 3. In a listing of international jobs distributed by the U.S. State Department on August 25, 2008, 78 required or preferred French, 27 a UN language (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian, and Spanish), 17 Spanish, 10 Arabic, 5 Russian, 3 German, and 1 Chinese.

French language enrollments in Utah schools grades 7-12 have been fairly consistent since the 2002-2003 school year, which had 13, 799 students. The numbers dropped to 10, 552 the next academic year and then increased to 11, 597 in 2004-2005. French enrollments stayed around 11,000 for the next two academic years and increased to 12, 874 in 2007-2008. The 2008-2009 academic year saw another increase, with total enrollments at 13,388. French is holding steady as the 2nd most taught language, other than English, in Utah.

In addition to the above numbers, there are 5 elementary schools offering French dual immersion. There will be 6 elementary schools offering French dual immersion programs to approximately 650 1st and 2nd graders for the upcoming 2010-2011 academic year, and Jordan School District and Park City School District are making plans to start programs for the 2011-2012 academic year. With dual immersion French programs on the rise, students will have a real advantage in the marketplace because they will be fluent in French when they graduate.

The above analysis shows that French is still a strong contender in foreign language enrollments in Utah schools. The national trend for French enrollments remains very consistent as well. Compared to similar Higher education institutions in the state, Weber State University has a strong French program. At Weber State University you can take French to satisfy your requirements for the BA. We also offer Bachelor of Arts degrees in French, French Education, as well as a Bachelors Degree in French with a commercial emphasis. WSU also offers minors in all three areas, as well as a Bachelor of Integrated Studies with French as one of the areas of emphasis. In addition we offer students the opportunity to study in France for one semester to a year in Orleans or for three weeks in the summer at La Rochelle.

Knowing French makes you more competitive in professional fields like law, transportation technologies, global/international distribution and luxury goods. Knowing French opens the doors to other cultures and countries like France, Belgium, Canada and many African countries. French is a dominant world language, so studying French will make your university degree just that much stronger, and knowing French will make you a better world citizen!

PAT BUCKNER COLLABORATION IN TEACHING AWARD

One award is given annually.

Award may be up to \$1000

Proposals for funding must:

- Facilitate collaboration between two or more language teachers in the same department, school, or in different schools, districts or across the state.
- Result in a product (curriculum, video, technology, text, workshop, etc.) that can be shared with the membership of UFLA.

UFLA TEACHER VITALITY AWARD

Award amounts will typically range from \$500 to \$1000.

\$500 Grants to Attend and Present at SWCOLT

Beginning this year, UFLA will award two \$500 grants to UFLA members who present a session at the SWCOLT Annual Conference. The next SWCOLT Conference will be in Fort Worth, Texas, on April 8 and 9, 2011.

SWCOLT is now accepting proposals for 60 minute sessions at www.swcolt.org, so please consider it. The UFLA grant policy is as follows:

"Each year, UFLA will award up to four stipends to UFLA members who present sessions at SWCOLT (two \$500 awards per year) or ACTFL (two \$1000 awards per year).

"To be eligible, candidates must: 1) be members of UFLA, 2) submit a copy of their session proposal to the UFLA Executive Secretary/Treasurer at the same time they submit it to SWCOLT or ACTFL, 3) notify the UFLA Executive Secretary/Treasurer when they receive official notification from SWCOLT or ACTFL that their session has been accepted. Any individual who receives a stipend from UFLA to present at SWCOLT or ACTFL will be ineligible to reapply for a period of five years.

"Eligible candidates will be evaluated by a committee appointed to that purpose by the UFLA Executive Board. It will be the responsibility of this committee to determine the criteria it uses for choosing award winners; however, the committee shall attempt to distribute the awards among teachers in both secondary and higher education. The committee will present the names of award winners to the UFLA Executive Board for approval."

Fourth Annual Summer Workshop for Spanish Teachers

On July 27, 28, and 29, 2010, the Pedagogy Section of the Department of Spanish and Portuguese at BYU hosted its fourth summer workshop for elementary- and secondary-school teachers of Spanish. In attendance were 35 teachers, 8 elementary and 27 secondary. The teachers participated in both large-group, plenary sessions as well as smaller, individualized, hands-on sessions. The Workshop's principal focus this year was on communication and technology in the language classroom. Grounded in the National Standards for Foreign Language Teachers (see ACTFL's *Standards for foreign language learning: Preparing for the 21st Century*, 1999), participants were taught strategies for contextualizing grammar and vocabulary, integrating culture and communication, and utilizing new technologies to facilitate language learning. The Workshop was, in effect, a mini Spanish immersion experience for the teachers, as virtually all of the sessions, breaks, and lunches were conducted in Spanish.

The workshops was sponsored by the College of Humanities, the Kennedy Center Outreach Program, CITES, the Spanish Resource Center, the Department of Spanish and Portuguese and the Utah State Office of Education. USOE also lent its support by allowing the teachers who completed the Workshop to receive two USOE credits, which can be applied to re-licensure and promotions.

Judging from the evaluative comments written by the teachers, the Workshop was enormously helpful and appreciated. Excerpts from the Workshop Evaluation Form include the following: "This is the first conference I've been to where I felt like I didn't even waste a minute of my time. Thank you so much!" "All the presentations were excellent—I am very grateful." "All of the technology was great. I loved the fact that we got handouts of all the info so we can use it at home. Everything was great." Many of the teachers are already talking about plans to come again next year.




BYU Offers Award-Winning Online High School Arabic Course



ARAB 41 — First-Year Arabic, Part 1 This course is the first in a two-part first-year series (ARAB 41 and ARAB 43) based on the most widely used textbook series, engaging online activities developed by BYU and University of California partners. ARAB 41 covers the basics of both spoken and written Arabic and enables students to acquire real-world communication skills, learning to use Arabic as Arabs do. Students learn to use Egyptian Arabic (the most widely understood "dialect") to accomplish day-to-day survival and social needs. They learn to read and write the Arabic alphabet, to read street signs and ads, and to write basic information about themselves and others. Students are introduced to key aspects of the culture and geography of the Arab world, knowledge that will aid them in their interactions with Arabic speakers. The course includes weekly live interaction with Arabic-speaking mentors.

Each year, UFLA will award up to two stipends to UFLA members who present sessions at ACTFL (two \$1000 awards per year).
