me why we work so hard for such little pay, because today is a really bad day?" Within minutes a reply hit my inbox: "Because we are changing the world one child at a time." I smiled and got back to work. You can't argue with a woman who is brilliant. (Thanks, Vonzaa. I needed that.)

May has arrived, and you're probably ending another long school year. In assessing the year, you probably see that it was filled with familiar challenges: curriculum that may not quite fit, parents who engage only to blame, proficiency testing standards, and students who have the potential to do something great, but are spending all their energy on sapping yours. At some point during the past nine months, you probably wondered if what you were doing even mattered. You might have even emailed a friend, like I did. It is sometimes hard to remember, but the long hours you

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worked before, during, and after school will have a lasting effect. You are changing the world one child at a time.

Today, I assessed myself. I looked back to see how I had gotten here. The year was 1974. I was in seventh grade.

I signed up for Monsieur Decker's French class. We memorized dialogues, spoke into bulky headsets, and watched grainy slide shows of his travels in France. I hated that class. And, I loved that class. The language was beautiful. The pictures were beguiling. I was mesmerized by a culture completely different from mine. I wanted to be the girl in those photos. I wanted to sound like the girls on the tapes. My reality, however, was much different. For me, French was hard! Sharon Showalter and Mark Davis scored higher than me on every test. The beautiful words just rolled off their tongues like Perrier down a duck's back. For the first time in my life, I wanted to be the best at something, and I wasn't. What followed was three years of working and working in order to prove to myself that I could be as good as Sharon and Mark. I don't remember if I ever got to be as good as they seemed to be, but I do know that through all that work something strange happened. I became hooked! M. Decker kept me always wanting to do better until he had created a little French-learning monster. I loved him--even though his class was the hardest I ever had.

When I hit Weber State College years later, I met the next French teacher who would change my life. Monsieur Godfrey. He was my next Monsieur Decker. Again, I was cursed and blessed with a very tough teacher. He pushed me until it hurt. Then he did it again. After a few years at Weber State College, graduation approached. By now, I had not only finished my schooling, but had also become a mom to two young children. Brittany was two, and Taylor was six months. While I loved French, and had dreamed of being a French teacher, I had never had the chance to actually travel to France or immerse myself in the culture. I wondered how I could ever teach French

without that necessary experience. With two small kids and no money, my hopes were dim. M. Godfrey thought differently. He was taking a group of students to study in La Rochelle that summer and insisted I go. Day after day he pushed me. He was relentless.

In the end, I borrowed money from every relative I had, left my kids in their father's care and flew to France for a semester abroad. That summer showed me that I could be a French teacher. M. Godfrey was right.

Students assess us. Principals assess us. Parents assess us. But, isn't it fascinating to assess ourselves? I'm forever fascinated by the path my life took because of the influence of these two great, demanding language teachers. You may not know it today. But, somewhere in that sea of faces you teach each day, is a person whose life will never be the same because of you and your passion for what you do. I know this job is the hardest thing you might ever do. I know you might need to email a friend and ask for him or her to remind you of why you do what you do for so little money. Next time you feel that way, email me. I'll remind you. W. B. Yeats said, "Education is not the filling of a pail, but the lighting of a fire." Thanks to all of you for lighting so many fires this year. Enjoy your summer!

UFLA TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

Each year the Utah Foreign Language Association recognizes one outstanding foreign language teacher as teacher of the year. **This year, three teachers may be recognized**; one each from elementary, secondary, and post secondary education. The nominee may teach any language or combination of foreign languages, with a minimum of 3/5 of their teaching

responsibilities being carried out within these disciplines. Membership in UFLA is not required, but if selected as Teacher of the Year, the candidate must join UFLA if the board determines that he or she is to be the nominee representing Utah for SWCOLT Teacher of the Year.

In order to be considered, the following must be completed by September 6th 2013.

- I. Personal Information: A cover sheet including all of the following information:
 - 1. Full Name
 - 2. Complete Home Address (Street, City, State, ZIP)
 - 3. School Name
 - 4. Complete School Address (Street, City, State, ZIP)
 - 5. Home Phone and School Phone
 - 6. List of all Classes taught
 - 7. Name and position of the person who nominated you
- **II. Portfolio:** The following items must be included:
 - 1. Letter of recommendation from a professional colleague
 - 2. Letter of recommendation from a supervisor
 - 3. Letter of recommendation from a current or former parent or student
 - 4. Curriculum Vitae of no more than five (5) pages
 - 5. Five-hundred word (500) first person statement on the value of learning language and culture
 - 6. Statement of willingness to participate in all required activities associated with the award including:
 - a. A commitment to attend the state conference to receive the award
 - b. Consent and commitment to be nominated by UFLA for the SWCOLT Teacher of the Year Award
 - c. A commitment to attend the SWCOLT conference for a personal interview if selected by the board to represent Utah at SWCOLT (UFLA will provide reimbursement for all reasonable expenses.)
 - 7. Examples of student work (up to five individual examples, one page -8 ½ x 11- and one-sided only) that reflect the goals of the National Standards for Foreign Language Learning
 - 8. Elective commentary (not to exceed 5 pages total) that describes how the student work examples are representative of the following:
 - a. The connection between the student work and how you address the national standards in your classroom
 - b. The connection between the student work examples and how you use and promote target language communication in the classroom
 - c. How the student work examples demonstrate differentiation of instruction and/or assessment to meet the needs of all learners
 - d. How the student examples demonstrate how you integrate culture into instruction and/or assessment
 - e. The type of feedback you provide to students

UFLA Awards

UTASLTA is a recipient of the *UFLA 2013 Pat Buckner Collaborative Teaching Award*. They held a conference May 10-11, 2013 for all deaf and hearing ASL educators in the state. The award of \$1000 will help the organization defray some of the costs of the conference, including two workshops given by Austin Andrews, a nationally recognized ASL educator. Greg Montgomery, the UTASLTA representative, has agreed to submit a report about the conference for publication in our UFLA Fall Newsletter.

Dr. Stephen Van Orden, German teacher at Timpview High School received a *UFLA Vitality Award* for \$1000 this year. He is traveling to Germany with 29 students. They will live with host families, and while there, they will conduct video interviews about every-day life of students and parents of the students who attend the Franziskaneum School, the sister School of Timpview High School. When they return home, Dr. Van Orden will use the video footage to create interactive iBooks. The iBooks will give the students more opportunity to learn about the German school system. The iBooks will be used for class activities, and the students will also be able to download them onto their personal iOS devices. The iBooks will also be available to all German teachers in Utah. Dr. Van Orden plans to offer a workshop for teachers on how to use iBook Author to make their own interactive iBooks.

Heather Christopher, German and Spanish teacher at Bingham High School and Tracy Randall, French teacher at Bingham High School are recipients of the *UFLA Vitality Award*. They will attend the National TPRS conference in Dallas, Texas. Tracy is a new teacher at Bingham High School, and she desires to acquire and apply TPRS techniques in her classes. Heather has been using TPRS in her classes since 2002, and she is going to the conference to improve her skills and to learn more about how to produce more proficient language speakers, especially in her advanced classes. They were each awarded \$750 to help with the conference costs.

Summer 2013 Language Teacher workshops Summaries

French & Francophone Studies in Cultural Context

Faculty: Dr. Christine Jones, Dr. Anne Lair, & Dr. Esther Rashkin

In this workshop, a variety of expert professors from the French Studies program of the Department of Languages and Literature will help teachers become better acquainted with important aspects of French and Francophone literature, culture, and history. Through presentations and discussions of an appealing

and thought-provoking selection of French and Francophone materials, teachers will improve their ability to interpret a variety of literary, film, cultural, and historical texts. They will also gain knowledge of materials and resources that will be of use in their classrooms, and they will improve their French language skills.

German Idioms & Images Past and Present

Faculty: Dr. Maria Dobozy, Dr. Michael Gruenbaum, & Dr. Gergely Toth

This workshop will examine the German language at the level of idioms, metaphors and proverbs to see how the imagery works in the contemporary language. One session will include a short survey of expressions from the Luther Bible that everyone has come to use in standard German. We will also examine the wit and humor of proverbs in modern media ("Die Katze ist am liebsten da, wo man sie streichelt.") and discuss the cultural assumptions contained in them. Sessions also will explore the metaphors related to modern technology ("Der Mensch bedient die Maschine und nicht umgekehrt."), and the imagery of current German language including slang. Readings will come from Wolfgang Mieder on Sprichwoerter and a short contemporary novel.

Teaching & Learning Hispanic Culture

Faculty: Dr. Sheri Anderson, Dr. Gary Atwood, & Dr. Isabel Dulfano This language immersion workshop will offer insights into the Spanish language and the rich diversity of Spanish history, literature, culture and peoples. Isabel Dulfano will present on literary analysis, focusing first on narrative analysis, and second on drama/ theatre. Gary Atwood will focus on the study of Spanish poetry; this class is designed to facilitate the use of poetry in the classroom and will review the basic formal elements of poetry as well as poetic devices. Participants will have the opportunity to practice teaching poetry to their peers and develop their own analysis of this genre. Finally, Sheri Anderson will provide an overview of linguistic variation in the Spanish-speaking world and help the participants to reflect on how to address this diversity in their Spanish classes. Participants will be exposed to basic linguistic concepts and terminology widely used in Hispanic linguistics, learn about major issues in Spanish variation and take a detailed look at the dialects of Spanish around the world.

BYU French Teachers Institute 2015

French Teachers are invited to start planning for the 2015 BYU French Teachers Summer Institute. The main purpose of the institute is to help French Teachers in the public schools improve and renew qualifications in French language, culture and teaching.

The program will include three weeks of study on BYU campus and three weeks of study and travel in France. We will live in Paris and spend five days visiting other French cities. All participants will take two graduate-level classes (French 620R—Contemporary France and SLAT 680R—Proficiency Oriented French Classrooms) for 6 graduate-credit hours and have the option for taking a course in Advanced Oral and Written Communication. These culture and pedagogy classes will have a common theme designed to take advantage of the extended stay in France and to help participants prepare outstanding lessons and materials for their classrooms.

Language Specific Organizations

Utah Teachers of Japanese

Murray High School is the first Utah school to attend the National Japan Bowl in Washington, D.C. They represented Utah very well.

Chelsey King, Olympia Baumgart and Marisa Calistro competed in well in the Japan Bowl. They were the first contestants from intermountain states in the bowl's 21-year annual national competition. Two hundred-twenty students from the United States came to compete in this year's competition. Some schools have attended every year since the Bowl's inception. Yet, in the opening ceremonies when the Murray students were introduced, they were treated just the same as the school's who have been there year after year or had larger number of participants.

In the area of culture the Murray High School students gave the correct answer for Manchurian Incident in 1931 that triggered Japan to withdraw from the League of Nations and has become a country of militarism. That was a difficult question in the culture round and they were definitely prepared.

The Murray students were met by the wife of the Japanese ambassador and she thanked them for learning one of the most difficult languages. In their travel to our nation's capitol the students also toured the Vietnam, Korean, WW II War Memorials, the Lincoln Memorial looking over the Capitol and the Washington Monument, they walked along the Tidal Basin under Japanese Yoshino Cherry Blossom trees, and went to the Cherry Blossoms Festival on the Pennsylvania Avenue.

After two days of competition, one of the private schools in Fairfax, VA earned the highest scores. The Utah Teachers of Japanese want to offer our congratulations to Tomoko Moses, the Japanese teacher at Murray High School, for her dedication to teaching the Japanese language and culture, she states, "This Bowl taught me a great deal [about] what Japan expects US students to learn: more in Japanese history and current topics while acquiring Japanese languages."

Language News

BYU Hosts Annual Foreign Language Fairs

On April 18th 2013, Brigham Young University hosted its annual Foreign Language Fair, a tradition that began in the 1950s and has continued for over half a century. BYU invites high school and junior high school students throughout Utah and the surrounding states to participate in a variety of language and cultural activities in Chinese, French, German, and Spanish. It allows students and teachers the chance to be creative in the language learning process and to immerse themselves in the language for a day. Approximately 1,000 students attended the Chinese Fair, 390 attended the German Fair, 1,400 attended the French Fair, and 2,830 the Spanish Fair.

There were many opportunities to practice language skills with competitions in events such as poetry, talks, skits, show and tell, and language bowl. In addition, large-scale simulations of target cultures were set up (Españolandia, La Petite France, Klein Deutschland, etc.) in which all students and volunteers were asked to speak only the assigned language, and a mock "jail" with "police" was set up for violators who used English. Students had the chance to write and send postcards to their parents, make small purchases, and practice their language in a variety of settings. The Chinese Fair was unique in offering martial arts, calligraphy, and a Confucius Institute speech contest where some were able to win scholarships to study in Szechuan, China, this summer.

Although the BYU FL Fair has traditionally targeted mainly high school and junior high/middle school students, the University of Utah has announced plans to host a separate fair for elementary school students beginning in 2014. Consequently, as of next year BYU will not accept registrations from elementary schools. We encourage elementary teachers to support the new fair at the U of U.
