Teaching Languages During a Pandemic

It goes without saying that the lives of all of us have been profoundly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Few of us could imagine at our February UFLA conference that within a month, our teaching routines would change dramatically.

I recently had the opportunity to supervise a student teacher in a second grade Portuguese dual language immersion classroom. Because face-to-face classes had already been suspended, I worried that this student might not be able to complete his student teaching. Fortunately, his mentor teacher welcomed the opportunity to collaborate with him in adapting to an online teaching environment, so I gave them carte blanche to come up with whatever activities and assignments they could.

I was impressed by the innovations that this mentor teacher and student teacher developed. To accommodate the attention span of young learners, they created short videos using Loom to present new material and review old material. They assigned students to create their own videos on Flipgrid and comment on their classmates' videos. They held weekly conferences with students via Zoom and assessed their learning using IXL quizzes. In short, they did what all good teachers do: they adapted their teaching to the circumstances.

At BYU, my colleagues and I were given three days to master Zoom and redesign our own classes for online delivery. Having never taught an online course before, I was more than a little apprehensive. Fortunately, I quickly learned that the principles of good online teaching aren't that different from good face-to-face teaching: backward planning, use of visual and audio materials to keep students engaged, lots of pair and small group work (using Zoom breakout rooms), and assessment of students' learning (using integrated performance assessments, which I found are well suited to online classes).

I've been touched by the commitment of Utah language teachers to continue helping students learn under challenging circumstances. Nearly all of us have had to learn new technologies, and some of us have had to confront family circumstances that make it challenging to teach from home. By and large, though, I believe we've risen to the challenge, and we've become better teachers in the process. My hat (or rather, my face mask) goes off to all of you. Please give yourself a well-earned pat on the back. Here's to hoping that next year we'll be able to pat each other on the back in person.

Alexandria, VA (June 2, 2020) - We are horrified by the killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis.

Eric Garner. Sandra Bland. Philando Castile. Alton Sterling. Breonna Taylor. Ahmaud Arbery. Countless others. Their lives—and the hope that came with them—were cut tragically short.

ACTFL denounces systemic racism and police brutality against the Black community, Native and Indigenous communities, and communities of color in this country. As we have stated before, racism, bigotry, and white supremacy have no place in American society. We share in your grief and commit to do our part to combat these ideologies and systems of hate.

We are angry and our hearts are heavy. As language educators, we play a pivotal role in developing the world view of young people in this country. We have a responsibility—to our students, to our colleagues, and to our profession—to create a learning environment that is not only safe from racism and hate but antiracist.
